A reading from Prophet Isaiah (6:1-8)

Here I am, send me.

In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord of Hosts seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings.

And they cried out to one another in this way:

'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of Hosts. His glory fills the whole earth.'

The foundations of the threshold shook with the voice of the one who cried out, and the Temple was filled with smoke. I said:

'What a wretched state I am in! I am lost.

for I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of Hosts.'

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. With this he touched my mouth and said:

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians (15:1-11)

I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.

Brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established; because the gospel will save you only if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you – believing anything else will not lead to anything.

Well then, in the first place, I taught you what I had

been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he appeared to James, and then to all the apostles; and last of all he appeared to me too; it was as though I was born when no one expected it.

I am the least of the apostles; in fact, since I persecuted the Church of God, I hardly deserve the name apostle; but by God's grace that is what I am, and the grace that he gave me has not been fruitless. On the contrary, I, or rather the grace of God that is with me, have worked harder than any of the others; but what matters is that I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.

Gospel Acclamation: (sung) (Jn 15:15)

Alleluia, alleluia! I call you friends, says the Lord, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. **Alleluia!**

Gospel: Luke (5:1-11)

They left everything and followed him.

Jesus was standing one day by the Lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats – it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat.

When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied, 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point.

When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me, Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

The Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE SYNODAL PATHWAY: WORDS FOR OUR JOURNEY: 'DISCERNMENT'

The process of 'walking together' which Pope Francis has set rolling in the Church is one which is informed by the idea of 'Discernment'. He is a Jesuit and this is a spiritual tool first clearly defined by St Ignatius, the founder of the Jesuits. I am sure we are all familiar with it though not necessarily under this name. When we have important choices to make (or even less significant ones) we need to make them with God at the heart of them. As Christians, we want to make the choice which is most in line with God's will.

'Discernment' comes from two Latin words: 'dis' = apart, and 'cernere' = to separate. We need to take difficult choices into prayer and listen to God through our moods and thoughts as we pray about the options. Which choice is more in line with God's values of Love, Compassion, Truth, Justice etc? This is not necessarily a straightforward process. We all have both creative and destructive tendencies within us and we have to learn to recognize which ones take us towards God, and which take us away.

Pope Francis is asking each individual and parish to 'discern' the way forward for the Church at a time of unprecedented crisis. The world is still gripped by a severe epidemic. There are great economic, social, military and environmental challenges and a massive technological pace of change. There has been a considerable falling away of membership of the Church. In response to all this, Pope Francis has put the Church into listening mode. He is inviting us to pray with the Holy Spirit to 'discern' how we, as people of God, can better deliver God's love to the world.

We are invited as individuals to pray and participate in listening exercises at parish level and to discern what we want to say about our Church, both locally and as an institution. The Church is not a democracy, but our thoughts will be noted and passed up the hierarchical pyramid to the very top, at every level invoking the Holy Spirit. Let us use this very special opportunity to 'discern'.

Prayer:

Help us, Holy Spirit, to respond to the Church's appeal to 'walk together' in this journey of renewal. Make yourself at home in our hearts. Help us to discern wisely what to say at meetings and in answering the diocese's questionnaire. May we contribute constructively and honestly, with love and kindness.
